DIABETES FACTS

In our district the commitment to advancing diabetes research has been unwavering. Through dedicated fundraising efforts such as charity auctions, golf tournaments, and community health expos, we have raised substantial funds specifically earmarked for diabetes research initiatives. Here are some key facts about this pervasive condition.

- Diabetes mellitus, more commonly known simply as diabetes, refers to a group of diseases that can cause high levels of glucose (a type of sugar) in your blood.
- Diabetes happens when your pancreas can't produce enough of the hormone insulin or your body becomes resistant to it.

- Symptoms of diabetes are feeling tired, hungry or excessively thirsty, and passing more urine (wee) than usual.
- Common diabetic conditions are type 1 diabetes, type 2 diabetes, gestational diabetes and pre-diabetes.
- You can manage diabetes by taking medicines to manage your blood glucose levels, adopting a healthy diet and being physically active.

If you have **Type 1 diabetes**, you will need to have insulin replacement. This may be through injections or an insulin pump. This helps control your body's blood glucose levels. There's nothing you can do to prevent type 1 diabetes. However, your lifestyle choices after your diagnosis can lower your risk of getting complications.

Type 2 diabetes can sometimes be controlled by lifestyle changes, such as eating a healthy diet and being physically active. Eventually, you may need to take medicines to control your blood glucose levels. Your doctor may prescribe tablets or injectable medicines (insulin or others). These will help to keep your blood glucose in the target range.

Gestational diabetes can often be managed by keeping blood glucose levels within a healthy range for pregnancy. This involves a healthy eating plan and regular physical activity. You may need medicine if you don't get good glucose control with lifestyle changes alone

There is also strong support from the sporting clubs, the scouts, who do the collection, and both Dromana Primary School and Dromana Secondary College.

Approximately 5,000 visitors made their way through the gates on Friday 5th and Saturday 6th, to attend the Lindenow Lions Club 38th Field Days at the Bairnsdale Aerodrome.

Despite the forecast of heavy rain for the Saturday, many of the 260 exhibitors reported more interest in their products than they had in recent years.

A feature of the event was the opening of the Gippsland Ag Group's new building which now provides an under cover Public Entrance. Prior to the opening, 100 guests enjoyed breakfast and a presentation which focused on "Wellness" and "Managing Difficult Times" while being a farmer.

The Lions Club Organising Committee has already begun planning for the 39th event which will be held towards the end of April in 2025.

2023 Wrap Up

10,040 child vision screenings conducted

2015 referred for further testing

Most common issues identified:

Stereo (Depth Perception)	756
Visual Acuity (Clarity)	599
Colour Perception	585
Astigmatism (Blurred Vision)	279

More than 750 Trained Screeners from over 340 Lions Clubs are now involved in the program, conducting vision screenings in schools, sporting and community based clubs, as well as general public screening locations.

Over 700 people have participated in training workshops or online training in the last 12 months, with almost 260 new qualified Screeners joining the team.

Over 2100 children have already been screened in 2024!

Success Stories - Focusing On Our Children

"Recently, 201V3 Zones 3 and 4 Vision Screeners have been to the Toongabbie, Cowwarr and Nambrok Denison Primary Schools in Gippsland with our LEHP Children's Vision Screening Program. Around 90 students aged between 5 and 12 have been screened at these schools, with approximately a dozen children recommended for further testing by an optometrist. This is an excellent program aimed at early detection of visual anomalies which are known to have a large negative impact on a child's ability to learn."

FREE TUTORING: “FROM LITTLE THINGS...”

Report from Lion Christine Andrews, Lions Club of Dromana:

A few months ago, Dromana Lions Club began a Free Tutoring program, for Primary school students who were struggling after the Lockdowns. This is a free program, run through the generosity of retired teachers and Lions club volunteers.

The students benefit from a one hour session per week during term time (one on one). Several other benefits have followed from this idea.

Many retired teachers volunteered, happy to get involved, glad to feel their expertise was helping give knowledge and confidence to these students.

Lions volunteers help run the sessions by welcoming the parents, students and tutors, making sure it is a safe, happy place to work in.

As one of these Lions volunteers I have witnessed the change in the students over the weeks, from shy children clinging to Mom, to confident smiling children bouncing into the room. Many of the parents have expressed their gratitude to the tutors and asked if their child could continue after the initial eight weeks.

It seems four sections of our community are benefiting from this program: Students, Parents, Teachers and Volunteers.

SERVICE PROJECTS

201 V3 RIDE FOR SIGHT 2024



Quite a milestone: the 30th Ride for Sight for 201 V3 has just been completed.

In doing so over \$1.2 million has been raised for CERA (Centre for Eye Research Australia).

Many thanks to numerous Lions clubs and Lions members who put their best foot forward and assisted in various ways to ensure the ride went off without a hitch. The ride was over 105km approx on day one and 65km approx day two with an over night stay at Cowwarr. We look forward to another next year and being able to raise even more money.

AUSTRALIAN LIONS FOUNDATION

"Helping Lions, Help their Community"

In 1983 the Multiple District Convention at Mt. Gambier delegates approved the establishment of the Australian Lions Foundation, to provide help and assistance in all forms for public relief, emergency aid and community welfare for persons in necessitous circumstances in Australia.

- Clubs and Districts are encouraged to submit applications, [understanding that there is no guarantee of its success] to the Foundation for assistance for intended projects of any size. The Foundation does not provide complete funding for any project. The goal of the Foundation is to assist the applicant Club or District, [subject to Foundation Grant Guidelines and ALF funds available] if they do not have sufficient funds to carry out the project. The decisions of the Directors are final and no correspondence will be entered into.

- Clubs must be members of the Foundation to receive any Grant funds, so Clubs who are not members are contacted on a regular basis by their District Chairpersons and given the opportunity to join.
- Funding of the Australian Lions Foundation comes from gifts by Lions and Leo Clubs, Zones and Districts, Individuals, Bequests and Interest Earned from Investments.

The generous financial contribution to General Funds enables the Foundation to continue supporting clubs and district projects. The Foundation also encourages clubs to gain Award credits.

ALF LTD. - AWARDS

Awards are a major fundraiser for the Foundation, and, more importantly, provide a vehicle for Clubs and Districts to recognise the efforts of Lions, Leos and others who make the world a better place.

The Awards available for Clubs to present to deserving Lions and Leos in recognition of their service and commitment:

William R Tresise Fellow Award Cost \$2000

Ian M Stockdale Humanitarian Award Cost \$1000

James D Richardson Honour Award Cost \$500

Community Service Award Cost \$250

The Community Service Award is an Award produced by the Foundation to enable Clubs to recognise Non-Lions in their Community for the work that they do to recognise individuals, organisations or groups that either support Clubs or do some exceptional work in supporting their local community.

50 YEARS TO LIONS SERVICE:

The Australian Lions Foundation Ltd approved the minting of a special Medallion to be presented to all Lions who have served 50 years as members of Lions Clubs International. It was recognised that this is a significant milestone of Service to Lions Clubs International in anyone's lifetime; Lions details to determine eligibility is provided to the Foundation from LCI; The 50 year Medallions are issued by the Foundation through the Awards Chairperson.

ALF covers all States and Territories - during 2022-2023 contributions to the needs of the wider Pride of Lions and community projects:

General & Award Donations District 201V3 - \$15,500, Multiple District - \$446,317

Emergency Disaster Donations District 201V3 - \$3,000, Multiple District - \$697,990

General Grants District 201V3 - \$46,873, Multiple District - \$561,995

Emergency Disaster Grants District 201V3 - \$100,000 (LC Bruthen), Multiple District - \$779,207

In addition, donations to the following Compassionate Grant Appeals were as follows: Tadros Family Appeal - \$131,730; Tarei Family Appeal - \$578,715; Sari-Elle Everest Marathon Appeal - \$30,050 (now stands at \$72,642)
