# 2025 RIDE FOR SIGHT

Of the forty-two riders 71% were male and 29% female. One of our riders came from Sydney, several from outside our District. Four riders were either blind or sight affected riding on tandems. Thirty-four riders were repeat participants. Age ranged from 34 to 80 years. All rode well and safely without incident.

 Day 2.: Traralgon – Heyfield - Sale 95km  
 Day 3: : Sale - Rosedale -Traralgon 85km  
 Day 4: Traralgon -Tyers -Traralgon 30km

We called by our expo display site at the Gippsland Performing Centre's courtyard as required on Day 1. We completed our Ride at the Gippsland Regional Sports Stadium where we were paraded and welcomed at the front of the convention.

We are thankful to the following Lions Clubs for hosting our breakfasts, lunches and dinners, without which our Ride would not have been possible:

- Yinnar Lions for lunch on Friday 2 May 2025
- Heyfield Lions for lunch on Saturday 3 May 2025
- Sale Lions for hosting our overnight stop on Saturday 3 May 2025
- Wellington Lions for hosting lunch at Rosedale on Sunday 4 May 2025
- Bairnsdale Lions for preparing three breakfasts – Friday, Saturday and Monday
- End of Ride lunch courtesy of the MD Convention Committee at Gippsland Regional Indoor Sports Stadium.

The primary purpose for our event is to raise funds for research and treatments to prevent or to eradicate blindness. Our Ride for Sight has raised around \$1.2 million since its inception in 1994. A challenging \$90,000 target was set for this year's event. Participants rallied and raised an enviable amount. We were fortunate to have Apellis Pharmaceuticals and Youlong Investments as major commercial sponsors. We also had strong support from several local businesses who either donated cash or provided work or items in kind. Latrobe Bus Lines for example provide a shuttle service gratis to and from our dinner venues. Hertz Gippsland provided a suitably large van to transport our baggage also at no cost.

We are thankful many Clubs in our District responded to an appeal to contribute to our operation costs and fundraising account. Considering the collective support and fundraising efforts, early indications strongly suggest we have certainly achieved and surpassed our \$90,000 target. This would be a Ride for Sight fundraising record. The final amount will be announced at our District Changeover in July.

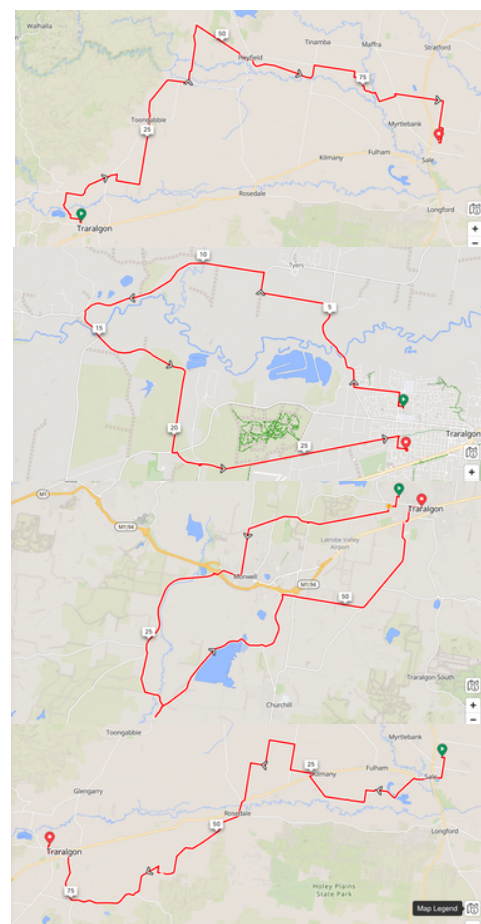

# DISASTER RELIEF

## ALF STORM AND FLOOD ALERT

### May 2025 Eastern Australia Storms and Flooding Event

As we are all aware, Eastern Australia is undergoing significant storms and flooding. Although the Australian Lions Foundation welcomes donations, we are currently well-placed to assist Clubs and Districts in their emergency, recovery and rebuilding efforts.

When conditions ease and the extent of damage is understood, we look forward to receiving applications for Disaster or Emergency Grants from Clubs and those applications will be processed quickly to ensure those clubs can commence their work in recovery.

The guidelines for these grants and application forms can be found on the website using this QR code:



### Emergency Grants

Funding support is to be provided by the managing Club or District through the provision of vouchers at local stores, debit cards, via store accounts established or vouchers produced by the managing club redeemable on presentation by respective stores etc.

CASH is not to be provided to recipients. Emergency Grant Funding is made available on the basis of \$1500 per adult and \$500 per child for the family affected.

### Disaster Recovery Grants

This grant is available to Districts for areas that have been impacted by a Disaster and help needed to assist with recovery / restoration / rehabilitation efforts.

When such disasters occur, Local, State and Federal Government and their agencies usually provide immediate relief to impacted individuals and families of payments through Centrelink or authorised agencies. Where this does not happen, due to the nature or severity of the incident, the Foundation may consider providing some immediate relief which would be in the form similar to that of Emergency Grants. These will be considered at the time.

Grants are provided to individuals or families but not for business related items, purely for personal/family needs.

### Promotional photographs

Lions are well known for their long-term efforts to support disaster and emergency response efforts. While we know that our Lions are focussed on the immediate emergency, photographs of Lions in action are critical to encourage donations and to grow membership. I would welcome photographs from Lions that can be used on our Social media and website.

Finally, all Directors send their best wishes and encouragement to our Lions members that are affected by this and other emergencies. It says a lot about our association that despite being personally affected, our Lions are out there helping others. Take care and look to the support of your fellow Lions.

## DISTRICT CABINET REPORTS

Greetings, Lions of 201V3 District. This is my first message to you as the District Governor Elect. 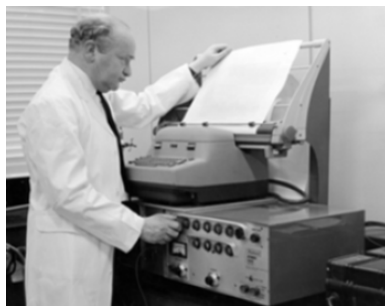


## BAKER INSTITUTE'S 99<sup>TH</sup> BIRTHDAY

**From Vision to Breakthroughs  
99 years of impact**

On 10 May 1926, Thomas and Alice Baker, along with Eleanor Shaw, laid the foundation for what would become the Baker Institute - a bold step sparked by a shared vision with pathologist John Mackeddle, to advance medical research at The Alfred Hospital. From a small lab at the back of the hospital, the Institute quickly became a catalyst for innovation: funding Australia's first hospital biochemistry department in 1922. The Baker Institute was instrumental in pioneering the discovery of the two types of diabetes, helping enable The Alfred's first open-heart surgery in 1957 with a heart-lung machine built in our own labs and established evidence of the link between compound analgesics and kidney disease which led to a ban of these painkillers in 1977.

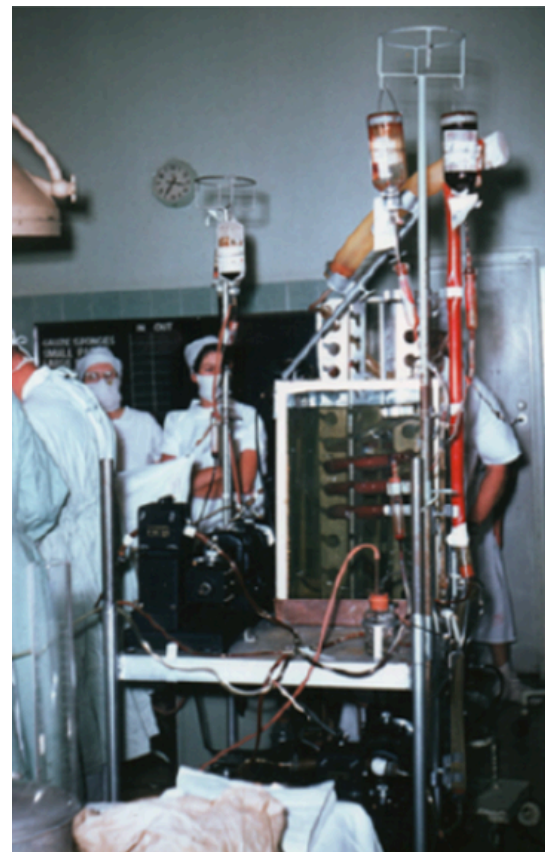
For nearly a century now, the Baker Institute has been driving life-saving research in cardiovascular disease, diabetes and related conditions - always translating discovery into better care.
