RED HILL TURNS 40!

Red Hill District Lions Club has celebrated 40 years of service to the local community.

The club was chartered in May 1985 and has worked tirelessly for the community ever since. Some of the projects over the years have included:

- 1988 commenced parking at the Market at the Red Hill Recreation Reserve.
- 1995 the club "harnessed the managerial and technical skills of members to design, facilitate, and project manage the construction of a sports oval to the same dimensions and camber profile as the Melbourne Cricket Ground. That oval became the Richard Hudson Oval.
- 1997 after a fire on Arthurs Seat, the Lions Club rebuilt the boardwalk from Flinders Cairn to Seawinds – a plaque marks the area and if you look around that area you will find it.
- 2002 the development of FUSION Youth Housing and Support Program at the old army barracks in Mt Matha.
- 2009 \$10,000 was contributed to the establishment of the Community Pavilion at the Recreation Reserve.

Since this time, Lions have funded projects of local organisations to help them be the best they can be.

Red Hill Lions' three-pronged approach to disbursement of funds focuses on Community, Youth, and Disadvantage, and they support many organisations each year to achieve their aims.

Sporting programs, scouting projects, community festivals (Easter Egg Hunt, Christmas Tree Festival), environmental projects, local celebrations (like the Show), school activities through scholarships and program development, and welfare organisations like Southern Peninsula Community Support and Westport Community Support. As well, the club regularly makes "in-kind donations" to help meet the needs of these welfare organisations. Food parcels, fresh produce, Christmas cakes, shampoos and soaps, and donated clothing. This year they are also supporting the Catalyst Tiny House project, to provide emergency accommodation for those in need.

In a highlight of the evening, the District Governor of Lions District 201V3, Ian Davey, presented Rob Connor with a Melvin Jones Fellowship, the highest form of recognition from Lions Clubs International. This award was named after its founder, Melvin Jones. It honours individuals for their exemplary service and dedication to humanitarian efforts, embodying the ideals of Lionism.

Rob has held many positions in the local Lions Club as well as other local organisations and has a proud history of giving back to his community.

"Your years of service, both within and beyond Lions, are a shining example of the values Melvin Jones himself stood for. Your efforts have touched lives, strengthened communities, and inspired those around you," said District Governor Ian Davey.

OUR HERITAGE

“DOING SOMETHING FOR SOMEBODY ELSE”

As we recognize those who contribute so much, via the Melvin Jones Fellowship, it's worth taking some time to learn more about the man himself - our founder, Melvin Jones.

Melvin Jones, born January 13, 1879, in Fort Thomas, Arizona, founded Lions Clubs International, transforming a simple idea into a global service movement. His credo, ***“You can't get very far until you start doing something for somebody else,”*** defined his life's work.

Early Life

Raised in Illinois after his family moved from Arizona, Jones settled in Chicago and became a successful insurance broker by 1913. An energetic salesman with a love for Shakespeare, he joined the Business Circle, a businessmen's group, but found its self-interest limiting.



Founding Lions Clubs

In 1917, Jones envisioned a service-focused organization, asking, “What if these men used their talents to improve their communities?” That year, he founded Lions Clubs International in Chicago. Elected secretary-treasurer, he shaped the organization's mission through its Objectives and Code of Ethics, later becoming its lifetime secretary-general.

Leadership and Legacy

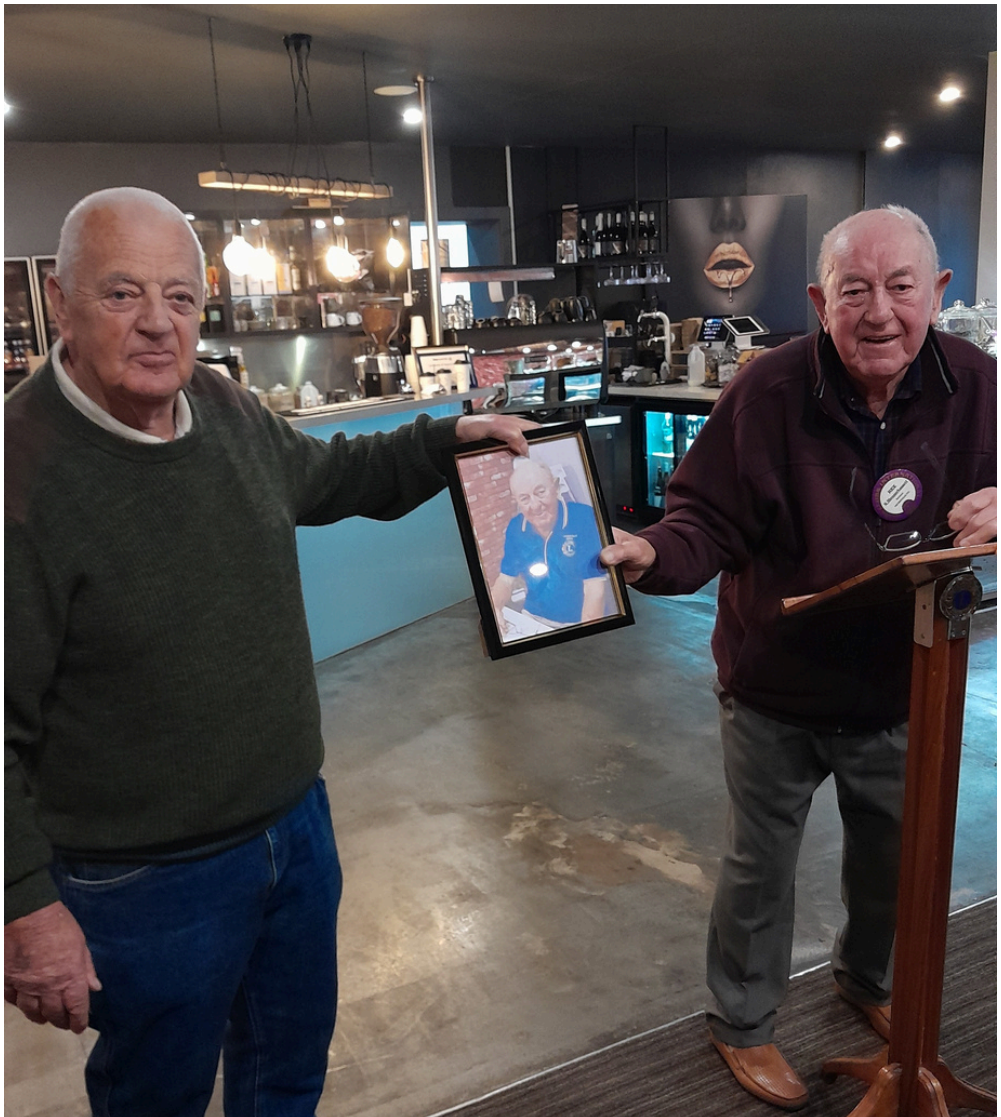
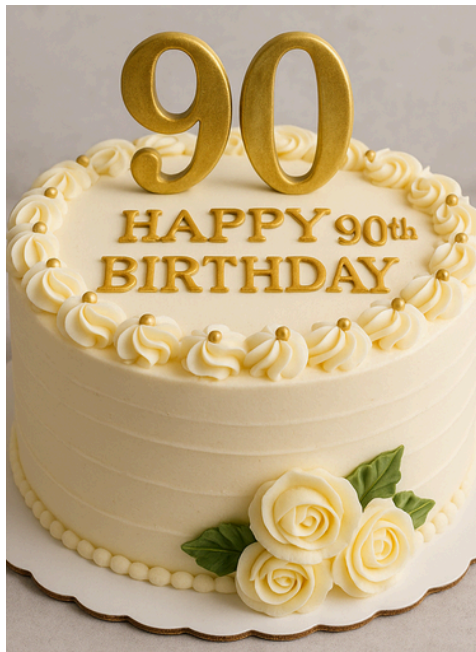
In 1926, Jones left his insurance business to lead Lions full-time, growing it into the world's largest service club organization, with over 1.4 million members today. He represented Lions at the United Nations' founding in 1945. His death in 1961 at age 82 marked the end of a remarkable life, but his vision endures.

Jones' legacy includes the Melvin Jones Fellowship Award, memorials, and a 2017 U.S. commemorative coin. His philosophy continues to inspire Lions clubs worldwide to serve their communities.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S REPORT

Greetings, Lions of 201V3 District. This is my first message to you as District Governor, and we are moving very quickly into the new Lion's year. We have heard once again the same joke about the outgoing DG moving from the role of rooster to feather duster, but I can assure all that Immediate Past DG Ian Davey will not enjoy "feather duster" status for long. He will be a valued member of the District Cabinet and I will rely on him for advice and support during my year as DG. Additionally, IPDG Ian has agreed to take on the role of LCIF Coordinator, so he will be your "go to" person for any LCIF queries. IPDG Ian has left 201V3 in good shape and I thank him for paving the way well as I take over the DG's role.

There is concern for the low level of reporting of service by Clubs in 201V3. At present, only 34% of Clubs in this District are reporting service, and this is the lowest level of reporting among all Districts in Multiple District 201. I am expecting to be grilled by my superiors on this low level of service reporting. I once thought that reporting of service was an unnecessary boast, but it is important. If you look now at the Lion Portal, on the opening page you see the accumulated of dollars donated and the numbers of people served worldwide. These figures establish the credibility of Lions International and the service information of each of the individual Clubs contribute to these amounts and to the credibility of our organisation. Further, organisations such as the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, support Lions International, in some cases on a dollar-for-dollar basis and our service reporting supports these philanthropic areas of support.

To report service on the Lion Portal you must be either a Club Secretary or Administrator. Every Club has (or should have) a Secretary and if you haven't already nominated an Administrator, you can contact the District Administrator, Ron Chidgey on ronaldchidgey@bigpond.com and he will set it up. Log on to the Lion Portal and you will see "Services" on the centre of the top line. Click on "Services" and it will take you to the next page. Click on "Create Service Activities Now" near the top on the right-hand side of the page and then just answer the questions. I am aware some Lions members are unable to access the Lion Portal – seek help, it's not difficult and you will need your membership number. If you don't have that and someone in your Club can't help, call your Zone Chair, they will find it for you. The Lion Portal may appear daunting when you're new to it, but it's not.

In closing, I would like to mention the value of interclub visits. When I joined Lions in Hay, NSW, our neighbouring Clubs were Jerilderie and Deniliquin each over 120km distant, yet we visited each other on a regular basis. These visits are valuable for fellowship, friendship and the exchange of ideas. I would like to see the Clubs in 201V3 continue to establish linkages with other Clubs in or outside their Zone.

Meanwhile, I continue to look forward to working with the Clubs and Lions of District 201V3 during 2025/26. Let's continue to have a great year serving better together.

MEDICAL EQUIPMENT FOR FRANKSTON PALLIATIVE CARE UNIT

Frankston Lions Club were recently able to donate ROHO Cushions (2) to the Frankston Palliative Care Unit. In conjunction with the District Cake Allocation Fund, the Club was proud to be able to present them to the Unit Manager.

Patients receiving palliative care often experience prolonged periods of immobility which puts them at a significant risk of developing pressure areas. ROHO cushions are the best line of defence against sacral pressure areas. In addition, patients with certain types of cancer experience significant pain in their sacral region and ROHO cushions have been found to be beneficial in relieving this pain. Providing these cushions aligns with the Palliative Care Unit's commitment to compassionate, patient-centred care and will greatly improve the comfort and dignity of their patients during their final stages.

The Palliative Care Unit value our Club's ongoing collaboration in facilitating positive outcomes for their patients and the local community.

GREEN CANOPY

The recent heavy rains in the eastern states saturating the soil may be causing havoc for many, however it also provides the ideal environment for soil preparation to plant trees and shrubs. Subsoil moisture is at a maximum ensuring ongoing sustenance for new plantings.

Selection of suitable plants is essential to maintain the balance within our ecosystem. I have spoken with Lion Garry Bates, the incoming District Environmental Officer from Q3, who has had discussions with professionals at the University of Southern Queensland regarding this matter. The balance within the ecosystem is extremely delicate and we must make every effort to retain that balance.

We are all aware of the precarious position of our koala populations in Queensland, northern New South Wales, Riverina and many other select areas across our country. Koalas, like many fauna, require very specific eucalyptus varieties to survive. With many of their areas being cleared for timber and property development and seeing limited appropriate revegetation of these native areas, our Koala populations have been decimated.

Another area of deep concern is the rapidly deteriorating native bee population. We are all aware of the essential work that bees do within our ecosystem. While collecting nectar, native bees cross fertilise the majority of flora and generate many food sources for insects and animals alike. They are essential to maintain the balance of our ecosystem and we must do everything possible to retain the native populations.

As we go about our Lions business participating in this Multi District project, we must be vigilant to select plants not just suitable for an area but of plants that retain "the balance". A thorough study of your terrain, the suitability of your area and investigation of the requirements of local fauna are necessary to retain the equilibrium of the ecosystem.

You may not have the native bees or koalas in your vicinity. You will, however, have issues unique to your area which it is important for you to address prior to jumping in and planting whatever plants are available. I ask you to consider these problems, talk to professionals with knowledge of your area then plant with a confidence that you have given your plantings the best opportunity to survive which in turn will best benefit the ecosystem. Remember that like everything in life, the ecosystem is only as strong as its weakest link and any break in that link can jeopardise its survival.

This project is not difficult when all resources are utilised. We continue to encourage clubs to work with your own communities and source knowledge to achieve their best results. Always remember, none of us are perfect. While we can make every effort to achieve the ultimate result, the forces of nature will determine this for us. Lack of or too much sun or water, soil bacteria, weed infestation, soil pH, pests and vandalism are all possible restraints to the perfect project result. If any of these happen do not lose faith. Assess the problem, work with it, restrict the likely damage, carry on and enjoy your results. We continue to see this wonderful project gain momentum and receive questions from both individual Lions and Lions Clubs for which we are most thankful. We emphasise that as members of the committee we are guardians of your project and happily pass on what information comes to us to generate the stimuli for Lions members to liaise with their local communities and at the same time grow our own knowledge of the environment.

Please continue to tell us what you are doing so we can all absorb and learn from your efforts.

WORLD FOOD PROGRAMME

The United Nations World Food Programme (WFP), the world's largest humanitarian organization, continues to combat global hunger, delivering food assistance to millions in 2025. From emergency relief in crisis zones to sustainable solutions for communities hit by conflict, disasters, and climate shocks, WFP's mission is transformative. A key initiative, the School Meals Coalition, aims to provide every child with a nutritious meal by 2030, boosting education and local economies. In Haiti, a partnership with Japan will deliver locally sourced meals to nearly 18,000 children across 80 schools, empowering smallholder farmers and tackling food insecurity.



In 2025, WFP's collaboration with Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has amplified these efforts. Through a US\$4 million partnership, with each contributing \$2 million, Lions International and WFP are supporting homegrown school meals programs in four countries. This initiative provides nutritious meals to children, fostering education and community resilience while addressing global hunger. Lions International's commitment to service shines through this coalition, aligning with their motto, "We Serve," and their mission to empower volunteers worldwide.

WFP's School Menu Planner (SMP) PLUS tool further enhances these efforts, optimizing school feeding programs in countries like Madagascar and Lesotho by reducing costs and prioritizing local ingredients. In 2024, WFP secured \$110 million from the USDA to support school meals in Bangladesh, Ethiopia, Laos, and Rwanda, benefiting nearly half a million children. Together, WFP and Lions International are building resilient food systems and feeding hope for a hunger-free future.
