THE LIONS CLUB OF LOCH SPORT SRI LANKAN CATARACT SURGERY PROJECT

In May 2024, Loch Sport Lions sponsored sixty patients in Sri Lanka to have cataract surgery performed, in partnership with clubs in Sri Lanka. Members Ivon & Mallika Tissera travelled to Sri Lanka whilst the surgeries were being performed.

The surgeries took place over a few weeks, with twenty patients at a time. Unfortunately two patients could not go through with the surgery due to medical conditions. Two more patients were chosen with their surgery being completed later in the year, in November.

The total cost was \$5,293 which Loch Sport Lions Club raised through raffles, lucky envelopes and markets. It was a very rewarding project and heart warming to see photos of the patients post surgery.

Cataracts are a significant health issue in rural Sri Lanka, where limited access to healthcare facilities and financial constraints often delay diagnosis and treatment. The condition disproportionately affects older adults in these areas, many of whom rely on manual labor for their livelihoods. Without timely intervention, cataracts can lead to severe vision impairment or blindness, greatly reducing quality of life and creating dependency on family members.

Geographic isolation further exacerbates the problem, as many rural communities are far from urban centers equipped with specialized eye care facilities. Awareness about cataracts and their treatable nature is also low, causing individuals to endure years of preventable vision loss. Projects like the Lions Club cataract surgery initiatives are crucial in addressing this gap, providing free or subsidized surgeries, raising awareness, and restoring independence and dignity to affected individuals.






How to Report Green Canopy Project on Lion Portal

Once you have logged into the Lion Portal, click on "Service" followed by "My Activities". Then click the blue button "Create Service Activity", and Club, plus "Next".



- 1. Use "Green Canopy Project Local Name" for Title.
- 2. Cause "Environment".
- 3. Project Type "Tree Planting and Tree Care.
- 4. Put in a brief Description about the project and the location the project occurred in.
- 5. Put in the Start and End Date and don't forget to tick Report Complete.
- 6. Remember to Upload Images.



- Remember to put in the Required Metrics.
- List number of People Served, Total Volunteers, Total Volunteer Hours, etc.
- Under Optional Metrics list "Trees Planted/Cared for".
- 10. Press "Save".

Successful Swan Reach Book and Craft
Fair

The annual Swan Reach Book and Craft Fair was held on the 17th November hosted by the Twin Rivers Lions Club as their main fundraiser event, and was a resounding success.

The event was held for the first time in the Swan Reach Recreational Reserve Rooms. Twin Rivers Lions Club President, Peter Payne, said that despite the threat of heavy rain and thunder, the attendance was excellent, being a little up on the last year.

This year's fair featured over 3,000 novels and several genres, together with boxes of themed magazines and technical books. These book boxes were prepared in author alphabetical order as well as in genres making it easier for those browsing and selecting the books available.

Book sales increased this year due to having novels arranged by author making it easier for readers to locate their favourite authors, Mr Payne said.

While in the carpeted room the Twin Rivers Boomerang Bags featured handmade items for sale including the Christmas collection together with tables of haberdashery items.

This year we included the merino wool display, and the wool dyed using botanical based dyes. There were weaving demonstrations throughout the day.

The 123 READ 2 ME children's books feature was a favourite with the children as they were seen to be rummaging through to choose the books of their personal choices free.

This year to the delight of those who attended we added Devonshire teas, and home-made sausage rolls served together with tea and coffee in the meeting room providing a comfortable space to sit, chat and enjoy the food.



The club's annual Spring Raffle was drawn at the fair and the winners were 1st prize ticket 333, second ticket 612, third ticket 441, fourth ticket 754, fifth ticket 514 and sixth ticket 420.

The Twin Rivers Lions Club Inc is appreciative of the ongoing support from many local businesses and this year the total prize pool was in excess of \$1,200 and were in vouchers or hampers.

END OF AN ERA FOR BRUTHEN LIONS

Farewell and thank you to our local Lions.

It is with sadness, and a deep sense of respect and gratitude, that we bid farewell to the Bruthen Lions Club, which is in the process of closing down this local chapter of the renowned international service organisation.

The Bruthen Lions Club was chartered thirty six years ago in 1988, and true to the Lions' motto 'We Serve' has provided support to the community in many diverse ways throughout that period. Its members have included a wide range of identities from Bruthen and district over the years ... some of whom (but by no means all) can be seen in the accompanying photos. These photos and more were brought in by Fran Cohn to be stored at Bruthen and District Neighbourhood House, where they will be keenly scrutinised by members of the group 'Bruthen Remembers'.

The current membership was down, however, to seven members: Simon and Fran Cohn, Max Harris, Peter Weeks, Alan Knewstubb and Ingrid and Mark Biram. All of them, like those before, had given so much over the years on top of their commitments to family, work and other needs. At the last meeting they realized they were not able to fill required board positions.

Closure of the Bruthen chapter had in fact been considered for some years, but the fires of 2019-20 drove an urgent need to mobilise the group's skills and resources. A major project undertaken was the East Gippsland Timber Milling Project (EGTMP), a joint venture with Rotary, DEWLP and Lions International which involved milling fallen trees into usable timber for fences, stockyards and more. This service was provided free of charge to fire-affected farmers, and was featured in Tambo Rambler articles in August 2022 and April 2023; these can be accessed online.

With funds from the Lions International Disaster Fund they were able to replace water tanks for properties that had lost theirs in the fires. The club also operated the Lions Tool Shed in Sarsfield, stocking around 200 items, with everything from shovels to power tools.

They assisted BlazeAid, providing relief shifts for crew, and hosted members of the Need For Feed runs. In the post-fire period they continued with improvements to the Lions Skate Park, including installing a new toilet block. There were special treats too, like the kids' trip to Gumbuya Park in December 2022. And they continued their long tradition of turning up to just about every community event you could imagine, providing coffee, donuts, food from the BBQ, drinks and raffles.

Now that they are closing down, they have been busy cleaning out their shed, and will be donating trailers, hospitality gear and more to the Lions at Licola. The EGTMP gear was purchased by the Australian Lions Foundation to be available in Victoria for future disaster responses. Remaining club funds will be shared amongst the football, netball and bowls clubs, with whom they have been in a mutually supportive relationship for many years.

While we are losing our local team, it is worth noting that there are still many Lions Clubs in East Gippsland that can continue to support the Bruthen and District community.

The Bruthen Lions have been involved in a very diverse and challenging range of projects over the 36 years of their existence, and across the district and beyond we have benefited hugely from the fruits of their labours. We thank them for their dedication, hard work and generosity of spirit.
